
Underlying premise of MARI...

Addiction (or Substance Use Disorder) is a disease.

 Evidence has shown that treatment can reduce addiction-related harms, including crime and overdose; <u>yet only a minority of addiction-affected</u> <u>individuals ever receive substance use disorder (SUD) treatment.</u>

 Linking individuals who commit an addiction-related crime with treatment could improve outcomes for those individuals and society.





Opioid-related deaths across U.S.






W ith suicides and overdoses on the rise amid the COVID-19 pandemic, Dane County Executive Joe Parisi on Wednesday convened the first meeting of a task force aiming to prevent such deaths.

Preliminary 2020 data from the Dane County Medical Examiner show increases in both suicides and overdoses. In 2020, the county reported 75 deaths by suicide, compared to 60 such deaths in 2019. Additionally, the county recorded 127 fatal opiate overdoses in 2020, an increase from 113 in 2019 and 98 in 2018.


Dane County opioid-related deaths: 2014-2020

Dane County Opioid Related Deaths 2014 – 2020





Dane County EMS Data: Suspected opioid-related overdoses





MPD overdose incident data





What is MARI?

 MARI is a <u>Pre Arrest Diversion Program</u> based on evidence-based initiatives in other cities, which have resulted in reduced overdose, crime & recidivism, and increased addiction treatment engagement.

 Adults are referred to MARI by law enforcement (LE) officers to the MARI Assessment Hub for formal, clinical assessment of their addiction & provided a treatment referral.


What defines success in MARI?

 If MARI participant remains compliant with their treatment plan and does not re-offend for <u>SIX months</u> after their initial offense date, all pending charges are withdrawn by LE.

MARI eligibility criteria

 Individuals are eligible for MARI if they are adults (18 years old or older), reside in Dane County, and committed an "eligible" nonviolent, drug use-related crime.

 The offense-related eligibility criteria were finalized during the program development phase by the MARI Ops Team in collaboration with, and approval from, the County District Attorney's and the City Attorney's offices.

MARI eligibility criteria

Inclusion criteria (all need to be met)

- Individual is 18 years old or older;
- Individual has ties to Madison or Dane County, WI (i.e., able to participate in the MARI program);
- Offense was committed in the jurisdiction of, and handled by MPD, and associated with charges planned to be pressed by MPD; AND
- Offense is drug use-related (crime related to alcohol use only is not eligible);
- Offense is non-violent and without a threat of violence; AND
- Offense falls into the category of "eligible" ones:
 - possession of narcotics / drugs or drug paraphernalia (for personal use, not for dealing), prostitution, retail theft, theft from auto without property damage, or burglary / theft from family members who are agreeable to not be pressing

Exclusion criteria (none can be met)

- Presence of valid arrest warrant enforceable in Dane County;
- Being on bail for domestic charges or for offenses, which are not MARI eligible;
- Being on probation or parole;
- Presence of violent felony conviction within the past 3 years;
- Being a registered sex offender;
- Being deemed as presenting danger to the program staff;
- Prior engagement in the MARI program (i.e., completion of the clinical assessment)

Overview of MARI referrals (Enrollment Period: September 2017 – August 2020)

- ◆ 349 MARI referrals made by MPD police officers; (20 of the referrals were from Dane County Sherriff's Office).
 - ◆ 20 duplicate or multiple referrals for same person.
 - ◆ 66 MARI referrals ruled "not eligible" upon review.




• 263 referred eligible MARI participants ("MARI Participant Group")

 - 60 started MARI, but did not complete the program ("NON-COMPLETER group")


MARI participation breakdown




MARI completion breakdown




MARI participant age breakdown




MARI age by participation




MARI gender breakdown




MARI gender by participation

MARI Evaluation

MARI preliminary evaluation analysis:

Total MARI participants - N = 263

(3 year period between September 1, 2017 and August 31, 2020).

Data sources for analysis:

- Law enforcement (LE) data on MPD arrests, police contacts and incarceration data (e.g. days in jail) from the Dane County Sherriff's Office.
 - 12 months prior to MARI incident.
 - 12 months after the MARI incident.
- Clinical data (start and end of the 6 month program):
 - Brief Addiction Monitor (Drug Use, Risk & Protection)
 - Depression (PHQ-9)
 - Anxiety (GAD-7)


- Historical Comparison Group (HC): persons identified by MPD who would have been eligible for MARI should the program have existed (N=52).
 - MARI eligible incident occurred between September 1, 2015 and August 31, 2016.
 - Data collected 12 months pre- and 12 months post.







Overdose Related Police Costs

- ♦ Historical Comparison Group N = 52 (Sept 2015 Aug 2016).
- ◆ MPD able to pull officer cost data on 51 of 52 overdose calls.
- \diamond 238 officers assigned to 51 overdose calls (x = 4.66 per call).
- 21,985 minutes logged by MPD officers on these 51 overdose calls (366.42 total hours or 7.18 hours on each overdose call).
- During HC period, each OD call cost \$388.15 (at \$53 per hour including fringe benefits per MPD budget office). Total cost related to HC group approximately \$20,184.
- Every 100 overdose calls cost MPD approximately \$40,000.

Prosecution of MARI Non-Engaged and Non-Completers

- Non-Engaged = 103; Non-Completers = 60 (N=163).
- LE referred charges on 158 cases (96.9%). 3 individuals had died from a subsequent fatal overdose shortly after their MARI referral; one was incarcerated on other warrants; one had charges dropped.
- 13 of 158 were "municipal ordinance violations" and referred to the City Attorney's Office. No further disposition information available.
- 145 cases were "criminal charges" referred to DA's Office.
 - 99 (68.3%) resulted in charges filed by DA (76 criminal; 23 to Drug Court or Deferred Prosecution).
 - ◆ 34 (23.4%) resulted in no charges filed (e.g. 20 dismissed; 14 unknown).
 - ◆ 12 (8.3%) had no information available at this time (e.g. pending charging decision)

Final Takeaways/Summary

 By offering addiction treatment in lieu of arrest and prosecution of criminal charges, pre-arrest diversion programs have the potential to disrupt the addiction-fueled cycle of crime, reduce the likelihood of future offenses, and promote public health and safety.

Pre-arrest diversion can both save a life and change a life.

 Programs like MARI can positively influence one's perceptions of the police and the role of the police in a free society.

City accepts \$1.2 million U.S. Dept. of Justice Grant for Pathways to Recovery Madison & Dane County initiative

MADISON, Wis. – A \$1.2 million grant will help Madison and Dane County create an addiction resource team to prevent opioid overdoses.

The Madison Common Council approved a resolution Tuesday allocating the money from the U.S. Department of Justice, calling the opioid epidemic a "public health emergency."

After nearly 80 opioid-related deaths in 2018, the new Pathways to Recovery Madison & Dane County initiative's goal is to reduce that number by 25 percent with the cooperation of emergency responders and public health officials.

- Three year follow up \$1,200,000 BJA COSSAP grant.
- (*Comprehensive Opioid, Stimulant, and Substance Abuse Program ; award #*2019-AR-BX-K032).
- Expands MAARI to other LE agencies in Dane County.
- Incorporates Self Referral (Safe Stations), Community Outreach, "Naloxone Plus" and Quick Response Teams.
- New grant helps fund numerous positions over 3 years:
 - MPD Addiction Resource Officer
 - MPD Data Analyst
 - Dane County Public Health Project Coordinator
 - MFD Community Paramedic Position
 - Dane County Human Services Peer Support Coordinator & MAARI Recovery Coaches.
 - Project evaluation by UW Population Health Institute.
